### **Student Services**

The 2009/10 school year has come to an end and we say goodbye and good luck to our graduating students.

We are aware that there are some students who applied to Ontario universities and did not receive an offer of admission. If you know of a student in this situation, please be advised that the Ontario Universities' Application Service (OUAC) runs an admission information service web site for qualified Ontario secondary school students who did not receive an offer of admission. They can log on to the site and inquire about possible openings at Ontario universities and amend their application if necessary. Students may also be able to submit marks for courses earned in summer school to improve their chances of being admitted to a university. They can log on to the OUAC web site at [www.ouac.on.ca](http://www.ouac.on.ca) and get the link. This site is available from June 3, 2010 until Friday August 27, 2010. Their phone number is 519-823-1940, extension 10 and they are opened from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each day except Thursdays when they are opened from 10:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Students that are still interested in applying to Ontario Colleges for September 2010 should be aware that some College programs may still be open and accepting applications. Check the OCAS web site at [www.ontariocolleges.ca](http://www.ontariocolleges.ca) for information.

For students who are not graduating in June 2010, the Ontario Universities' Fair will take place from September 24 to 26, 2010 at the Metro Toronto Convention Centre, South Building, 222 Bremner Blvd. Parents and students from all grades are invited to attend and will have a chance to talk to representatives from all of the Ontario universities.

The Ontario College Fair will take place on October 19, 2010 at the Direct Energy Centre.

Students who will be graduating in 2010/11 are encouraged to begin their search for scholarships in early September as they begin to be available right away. Come to the Guidance office for information.

Students and parents are reminded that if a student attends summer school anywhere **outside** the Toronto District School Board, the student or parent is responsible for providing us with an original, signed report card from that summer school. The report cards can be brought in anytime beginning on August 23, 2010.

Appointments for timetable changes that must be made as a result of any summer school courses or previous failed courses can be made by contacting the Student Services office at 416 394-7840, extension 20040. There will be someone in the office from August 23, 2010 to book appointments and receive summer school report cards. Guidance Counsellors expect to be in the school on August 27, 30, 31 and September 2. You should make an appointment to meet with one of the Counsellors.

Students and parents are reminded that it will be difficult to change timetables in September. If students are unable to make an appointment prior to the start of the school year, the following days are the only days we will be making timetable changes in the 2010/11 school year. Before the start of the school day on September 8, 9 and 10, students can pick up a ticket in the Guidance office and they will be called down to discuss their request for a timetable change. We will also see students from 3:20 p.m. until 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday September 8 and Thursday September 9. Students wishing to drop courses will be allowed on an individual basis and this can be done past the first week of school. Keep in mind that students must keep a minimum of 6 courses.

This year we are saying goodbye and good luck to one of our Guidance Counsellors who is retiring after 30 years of teaching in the Toronto District School Board and the former East York Board of Education. Ms. Parissi has been a valuable member of our team and both staff and students will miss her. We wish her all the best in her retirement.

### **News from the Library**

We've had a productive and busy year in the library. Over 382 classes from all departments were booked into the library over the course of the year. Students received hands on help with researching, sourcing and written assignments. The library's 35 computers were also available to senior students on spares and everyone at lunch and after school. Our dedicated student volunteers earned community hours and helped everything run smoothly.

Many students took part in the OLA Whitepine reading contest and others entered the short story and poetry writing contest. For the first time, we had a library club for students, the Ram Readers. Members helped organize displays, ran contests and met weekly to discuss books. The library also invited four guest speakers to speak to students-including authors Michael Redhill and Lesley Livingston, as well as director Paul Saltzman of **Prom Night in Mississippi**.

Finally, the library ran a much needed inventory over the course of three days to evaluate our collection. Many new curriculum related materials were purchased as well as a large number of new fiction books. Many students were delighted with the addition of many more graphic novels.

On a final note, encourage your children to read over the summer. Have them check out the enclosed suggested summer reading list. Have a great summer and we look forward to seeing everyone in September.

### **Social Science**

Once again it has been a very active year for the Social Science Department. The earthquake in Haiti became an area of study for our Grade 9 Geography classes. Ms. Mori organized an activity around the simulation called "**Ayiti**". After researching the efforts Canadians have made in helping rebuild Haiti and tracking our own fresh water use, classes raised \$250 to donate to a Canadian relief organization of their choice.

Grade 10 students had a rich year studying History and Civics. A select group of students were chosen to represent ECI at the **TDSB History & Civics Contest** at Monarch Park Collegiate on May 12th. Three teams of knowledgeable and enthusiastic students competed against 40 other teams from TDSB. The Historica-Dominion Institute organized a book of Condolences for Mr. John Babcock, Canada's last veteran of the Great War. When he passed away this Spring, many of our Grade 10 students contributed to this book with moving letters, visuals and poems.

Our Civics students also participated in the **Youth Philanthropy Initiative** (YPI) this year. Student groups researched and visited local, grassroots charities and then created presentations advocating for their charities to win a \$5000 grant from the **Toskan Casale Foundation**. The best presentations competed at an assembly on May 11th where **Second**

**Harvest** was chosen as the winning charity. Kateryna Melnykova, Karen Alexander-Rybak, Liza Orlova and Nicole Oliver presented a \$5000 cheque to Second Harvest at a special celebration on May 28th at the Metro Conference Centre. Thanks to Ms. Oxley, Mr. Drennan, Mr. Brownhill and Ms. Wilson for organizing YPI.

On April 22 Ms. Hooke's Grade 11 American History class and Ms. Crawford and Ms. Oxley's Grade 12 Challenge and Change in Society classes, attended a special presentation of the film **Prom Night in Mississippi**, featuring Morgan Freeman. Paul Saltzman, the director of the film joined us for this event. In the morning students viewed the film in the auditorium and in the afternoon we met in the Library and discussed the film with Paul Saltzman. Thanks to Ms. Anderson and the Library staff who helped organize this day and made this special opportunity possible.

On May 5th, the Grade 12 World Issues, Politics, and Environment classes attended the **Hot Docs Film Festival**. They watched two documentaries entitled **The Congo in Four Acts** and **Gas Land**. The first film was about life in the Congo and covered issues of health care access, infrastructure problems, misogyny and violence, justice, child welfare, and farming. The second film presented the timely topic of the natural gas industry in the USA. Evidence of fresh water contamination, habitat destruction and health threats, engage our students further understanding of how political, economical, environmental and global issues are inextricably intertwined. Thanks to Ms. Mori, Ms. Oxley and Ms. Nguyen for orchestrating these field trips.

Two other activities of the Social Science Department include the Model UN and the Windsor Diaspora Conference. Charles Darkwa, Shaquille Monroe, Gonffa Krow, Omar Malden and Ms. Hooke attended the **African Diaspora Youth Conference** at Windsor University on May 13th, 14th, and 16th. The theme for this year's conference was *Media Matters* and the students were honoured to hear Dr. Raphael Heaggans from Niagara University provide the Key Note Address. Highlights of the conference included meeting students from the Windsor area and other TDSB schools, attending a variety of workshops and visiting two museums: **The John Freeman Walls, Underground Railroad Museum** and **the North American Black Historical Museum**.

On Wednesday, April 28th to Friday April 30th, eight ECI students attended the 38th Model United Nations at the University of Toronto. Representing San Morino, Brunel Darussalam and Seychelles, our delegates were active participants in the General Assembly, and several other committees like the World Health Organization (WHO) and the United Nations Environment program. Agnes Song, Sezen Abtizhoheva and Ms. Mori were honoured to attend the **Lieutenant Governor's Reception**. So all in all, it was a very meaningful and enriching year for our students.

### **Moderns**

As the year comes to a close, we wish the best to all our students in their exams and hope they will continue to pursue a second language in their studies next year.

This year we were entertained by Marc Tardiff, an illusionist and magician and a very talented one as well. He spoke to us in French, Spanish and

English as he performed.

### **News from the Science Department**

In early May, a few grade 9 science students had the opportunity to attend the Sick Kids Hospital Science extravaganza. The two day field trip included a day spent at the hospital visiting the research labs and meeting researchers, and another day spent at the science center. It proved to be an exciting field trip as our students were allowed to see and use some very advanced technology.



The grade 11 physics class held their bridge competition and this year's winner was Luke Fregonese. His beautiful bridge held the most weight out of approximately 90 bridges tested. Luke's bridge, massing 400 grams, supported a force of 1937 Newtons at its center which is the equivalent as lifting 198 kg. Luke's bridge, as well as the second place bridge made by Sezen Abtihodzheva (1567N or 160Kg), are on display in the science display case located near room 142. Congratulations Luke and Sezen!



Select grade 12 Physics students participated in the University of Waterloo physics contest which occurred in early May. As well, many chemistry students participated in Science contests this year. The Avogadro exam provided by the University of Waterloo proved very popular this year with our chemistry students. Thank you to all students who participated in the Science contests.

Seven senior ECI students participated in the University of Toronto Biology Contest which was held on April 29th, 2010.

### **English**

It has been a really busy and exciting time in the English department. Grade Nine students had the opportunity to see **Romeo and Juliet** at Hart House in May. The Toronto District School Board does **not provide accident insurance coverage for student injuries that occur on school premises or during school activities**. Accidents can and do happen. Some injuries incur medical, dental or other expenses that are not covered by provincial health care or employer group plans. **As a parent or guardian, you become responsible for these expenses.**

For your convenience, the Board has arranged a Student Accident Insurance Policy exclusively through Reliable Life Insurance Company. **Participation is voluntary but highly recommended** and the costs are to be paid by the parent or guardian. Benefits included are:

- dental expenses (resulting from an accident)
- total and permanent disability
- paralysis/loss of use
- special disability benefits
- death benefits.

If your child participates in co-curricular activities or activities outside the school day, there is a plan tailored to your needs. **All rates are a one-time annual premium per student**, with a variety of plans and benefits offered at affordable prices. Available plans range from **the Limited Plan at \$3.50, the Bronze Plan at \$12.00** and additional plans up to \$26.50. Family rates for 3

or more children are also offered.

The insurance agreement is between **you** and **Reliable Life Insurance Company**. Students in JK to grade 8 can also subscribe by using the brochure that was provided by your child's school.
